About Susan Huntington

Susan L. Huntington is Distinguished University Professor and Professor of History of Art at The Ohio State University. She received her PhD in South Asian Art at the University of California, Los Angeles. Her main areas of scholarly interest include the art of the Pala dynasty of eastern India and Bangladesh, ca. 800-1200 CE and the dissemination of the Pāla school to the Himalayas, Southeast Asia, and other Buddhist regions. More recently, she has concentrated on the early Buddhist art of India. Her most important publications include 'The "Pāla-Sena" Schools of Sculpture' (1984), 'The Art of Ancient India' (1985), 'Leaves from the Bodhi Tree' (1990), 'Early Buddhist Art and the Theory of Aniconism' (Art Journal 49, 4, Winter 1990), and 'Aniconism and the Multivalence of Emblems: Another Look' (Ars Orientalis 22, 1992). As a result of her extensive field documentation with her husband and fellow art historian, John C. Huntington, she has compiled an archive of over 300,000 original photographs of Asian art (http://huntingtonarchive. osu.edu/).


Previous Gonda Lectures

Art as Text, Art as Document: Understanding Buddhism Through Art

In order to understand the beliefs and practices of a religious tradition, it is essential to carefully examine its written texts and literary documents. Susan Huntington will propose in her lecture that works of art can also serve as primary documents by which a religious tradition can be analyzed. By examining some of Buddhism's most foundational practices, such as relic veneration, meditation, and monastic life, Huntington argues that visual materials play a pivotal role in Buddhism and that the study of works of art is essential to an understanding of Buddhist beliefs and practices. Further, rather than simply supplementing information that can be gleaned from written materials, works of art can provide unique documents for the study of Buddhism.
